Karen Tuttle and Jan Del Nero took posters to several preschools, libraries, town halls, schools, and churches in Piscataway, Middlesex, Dunellen and South Plainfield. WHAT DO WE NEED?

Infants and children's clothing and bedding of all kinds. Fish, Inc. Clothing Program is in serious need of infants and children's clothing. Over the past few months, three major sources of children's clothing donations have stopped sending us their clothes. we have had to scale back on the number of clients we can serve, and on the amount of clothing that can be given out, as well as limiting the number of times per year clients can access the Clothing Room.

Please prayerfully consider how you can help. Donations of infants and children's clothing, as well as all types of bedding, may be brought to the clothing room at 456 New Market Road, Piscataway. Leave your donation on the second porch marked Clothing Room. For directions to the Clothing Room leave a clear, understandable message at 732-968-0520. A reminder – all donated items must be clean and in good condition.

Food. Our food shelves are almost empty due to the summer slow-down in donations, and to poor economic conditions. It has been necessary to purchase food to supplement the donations that we get to meet the needs of our clients each month. Non-perishable items are needed, and may be brought to one of the participating churches or to the Food Room at 456 New Market Road, Piscataway. For information about participating

churches in your area, please call the Fish Hotline at 732-356-0081 and a telephone volunteer will return your call. Remember – hunger never takes a holiday.

Volunteers. The Food Room needs a few strong people who can commit to a few hours once a month to help load bulk items onto the Fish truck for delivery to the senior communities we serve. If you can lift up to 50 pounds and can help either monthly or on special occasions, please call the food room at 732-968-7925 to let us know when you are available. Also, we need a person who has a heart for the poor and feels called to provide some oversight and direction for the every day operation of the food pantry.

The New Market Baptist Church sponsors a monthly food drive outside the Acme Supermarket in Middlesex on Saturdays. They are in need of additional volunteers, especially now that the cold weather is upon us. If more volunteers could come out, each would have to spend less time outside in the cold.

In addition to rounding up toys for children in the New Brunswick area, gifts are also distributed to families of our service men and women who serve with the U.S. Coast Guard.
